Looking forward to seeing you there.



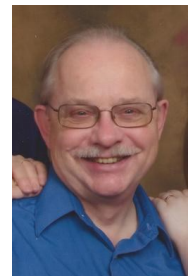

## Infusing Life with Magick by Sage

As a practitioner of the Craft I have found most of us share a deep and intrinsic relationship with the Earth. For me, she is an embodiment of the Mother Goddess, my Earth Mother, and the bounty of her gifts is astonishing. A mainstay in my practice is working with her plants. The original Witches, Wise Women, worked with plants. I love working with the “weeds” of the herb world.

“Weed” plants such as comfrey, wild yarrow, stinging nettle, dandelion and purple clover are not only a food source, but are used in medicinal approaches for poultices, salves, infusions, tinctures and extractions, I involve them in my Craft as well.

Stinging nettle is used in healing teas. In

nature it is prickly and earns its name because it often leaves a rash in the wake of its bite. I make a small mojo bag or fill a jar with it to keep away someone who causes me distress and pain, while I work on healing myself from their influence. Or, I meditate on the plant when someone difficult in my life needs healing or to help me to be more understanding.

Dandelion – I love this plant! - brightens a room. It’s a sunny little flower has a tenacity to grow and is indifferent to adversity. It feeds our bees and is the bane of well kept lawns. Its tea helps digestion, its leaves are edible, and its head makes great salves. What does dandelion bring to my altar? It strengthens me, allows me to dig in deep and

not let go, brings me abundance and prosperity. I look to dandelion when I need to grow and branch out and find a way where there seems none. At the end of its life, the dandelion becomes a seed head, allowing itself to be taken where the wind will take it. For me, a lesson to lighten up and let go, this from the plant that holds on so well!

I am honored to walk the path of my ancestors, to work the earth and herbs as the wise ones did; excited to use them in new, creative ways.

## The Medicine Wheel by Security Barbie

A friend commented that many people are building Medicine Wheels in their yards and asked I built one in mine. I never really thought about it, but something inside me wanted it, so I built it. I had read about the Medicine Wheel a while back, but had forgotten its true meaning. So I meditated by my wheel for a few days and its meaning became clear to me.

I am going through some major changes in my life and the Medicine Wheel seemed to be calling me. The knowledge I had gained from the past study began coming back to me.

According to Kenneth Meadows in his book *The Medicine Way – How to Live the Teachings of the Native American Medicine Wheel*, the word ‘medicine’ means more to the American Indians than to just heal a sick, run down physical body; medicine is also knowledge. “The ‘Medicine Wheel’ might be defined as, ‘a Circle of Knowledge that restores wholeness and gives power over one’s life.’” It is a way to connect with one’s inner self and for tuning into the psychic energies of Mother Earth.

I have always known that everything is connected and that there are many cir-

cles of power. The Medicine Wheel is a Circle of Power that can help teach us lessons at each stage of our lives, and help us to move on to the next lesson as we travel the Wheel of Life. The Medicine Wheel helps me to find my true power, or Medicine, and helps guide me as I travel my life path.

I guess you could say that I have built a Medicine Wheel in my yard to help me gain knowledge and to grow in the right direction.

## Recipe Hour with Michelle B.

### Fried Green Tomatoes.

First you must go into your garden. Take off your shoes and dig your toes into the earth. Close your eyes, raise your face to the sun, and breathe deep.

Now that you have taken a moment to enjoy and just be you can find some nice green tomatoes.

Take them back inside to wash and slice thin. Make a flour dredge with flour, salt, and pepper. Make an egg wash with eggs and milk. Make a breading with flour, corn meal, salt, pepper onion powder, garlic powder, and paprika.



Heat some oil in a pan (I prefer olive oil and a cast iron skillet). Once the oil is hot, dredge the tomatoes in the flour, then egg wash, and then

the breading.

Fry crispy and serve hot.

No. If photography isn't your craft and you'd like to do a more 3-dimensional craft from knitting to sculpting or woodwork you can do that.

Just please keep in mind that there's limited space in registration (not too big). And note that you will have to bring that with you when you come to the festival.

The council will only be taking the photograph submissions ahead of time. Though, an email with a note to us so we know you'll be bringing something, and maybe a photograph of your work before you show up would be nice.
